Expedited Bill 23-20 would authorize the Director of the Department of Emergency Management and Homeland Security to dispose of goods donated to the County during a state of emergency without competition if the Director determines that the goods would be useful to others during the emergency. The goods must be disposed of consistent with emergency procedures and prioritization guidelines established by the public official declaring the emergency or the Executive.

Expedited Bill 23-20, Contracts – Management and Disposal of Goods – Emergency Procedures, sponsored by Lead Sponsor Council President at the request of the County Executive, was introduced on April 14, 2020. Action is tentatively scheduled after this hearing.¹

Bill 23-20 would authorize the Director of the Department of Emergency Management and Homeland Security to dispose of goods donated to the County during a state of emergency without competition if the Director determines that the goods would be useful to others during the emergency. The goods must be disposed of consistent with emergency procedures and prioritization guidelines established by the public official declaring the emergency or the Executive.

The County has recently received donations of masks and other personal protective equipment that can be used by health care workers and other essential workers. Bill 23-20 would permit the Director to distribute these donated goods consistent with the emergency procedures and prioritization guidelines established by the Governor during the Covid-19 pandemic. The Bill would take effect on the day it becomes law and apply to goods received by the County on or after the Governor's March 5, 2020 declaration of emergency.

The OMB fiscal impact statement indicates that the Bill would have no fiscal impact on the County's resources. See ©6-7. The County would be acting as a pass-through for donated items. We did not receive an economic impact statement when this staff report went to print. To the extent the Bill would permit these donations to be used quickly during the Covid-19 public health emergency, the Bill may have a positive impact on the County's economy.

AN EXPEDITED ACT to:

- (1) authorize the disposal of certain goods received in response to a declared emergency without competition;
- (2) require the disposal of goods in a declared emergency in accordance with emergency procedures and prioritization guidelines established by the public official declaring the emergency; and
- (3) generally amending the management and disposal of goods by the County.

Montgomery County Code Chapter 11B, Contracts and Procurement Section 11B-44

The County Council for Montgomery County, Maryland, approves the following act:

Sec 1. Section 11B-44 is amended as follows:

11B-44. Management and disposal of goods.

- (a) The Director must ensure the management of goods during their entire life cycle.
- (b) Except as provided in subsection (f), the [The] Director must dispose of surplus goods. In disposing the surplus goods, the Director may sell the goods by any competitive method which the Director determines is likely to bring the highest return to the County. These methods may include sealed bids, public auction, or trade in or exchange of goods. The Director may sell surplus goods by private sale if the Director determines that open competition is not likely to bring the highest return to the County.
 - (c) After public notice, the Chief Administrative Officer may give, loan, or sell below fair market value, surplus goods to another public entity if the Chief Administrative Officer determines the disposition would benefit the residents of Montgomery County. Public notice may be given through the Montgomery County Register.
 - (d) If surplus goods have no resale or scrap value, the Director may dispose of the goods in any responsible manner.
 - (e) Notwithstanding any other provision of County law, any gun that is surplus must be destroyed.
 - (f) During a period when the County is under a state of emergency order issued by the Federal, State, or County governments, the Director of the Office of Emergency Management and Homeland Security or the

RE: Proposed Bill: Disposition of Goods Donated in Emergency

I write to request that the Council take immediate action to approve the enclosed expedited bill, which would authorize the Department of Emergency Management and Homeland Security to dispose of goods received in response to a declared emergency in accordance with emergency procedures and prioritization guidelines and without the need of a competitive process.

The procurement law's general requirement that the County dispose of surplus goods in a competitive fashion is not suitable for goods donated to the County for quick disposition during an emergency, such as the current coronavirus pandemic. The County has already received a number of these goods (e.g., masks). The law does permit the County to sell these goods below fair market value to another "public entity," but many potential recipients of these goods, such as hospitals and nursing homes, do not meet the definition of a "public entity."

Fiscal Impact Statement Council Bill XX-20, Disposition of Goods Donated in Emergency

1. Legislative Summary

This Bill authorizes the Director of Emergency Management and Homeland Security (OEMHS) to dispose of goods donated to the County during a state of emergency without competition, if the Director determines that the goods would be useful to others during an emergency.

The Bill would not change existing emergency procedures and guidelines established by the public official declaring the emergency.

2. An estimate of changes in County revenues and expenditures regardless of whether the revenues or expenditures are assumed in the recommended or approved budget. Includes source of information, assumptions, and methodologies used.

There are no administrative and programmatic expenditures or revenues associated with implementing the proposed changes to the law.

Goods may be donated to the County for use during an emergency. This amendment would allow the County to pass donated goods to nonpublic entities such as hospitals, nursing homes, and private health providers more expediently during an emergency. Because these are donated goods for the purpose of addressing an emergency, the County does not intend to sell or obtain a profit from a third party.

3. Revenue and expenditure estimates covering at least the next 6 fiscal years.

There are no revenue or expenditure items associated with this Bill.

4. An actuarial analysis through the entire amortization period for each bill that would affect retiree pension or group insurance costs.

5. Later actions that may affect future revenue and expenditures if the bill authorizes future spending.

The Bill does not authorize future spending.
